Current Situation

Pakistan is facing one of the worst flood emergencies in its history, with farmland, villages, and entire communities under water. The heavy monsoon rains, made worse by changing weather patterns, have hit key regions including Buner, Swat, Shangla, Gilgit-Baltistan, Eastern Punjab, Sindh, and Khyber-Pakhtunkhwa. In Punjab alone, rainfall was 26.5 percent higher than last year, leaving fields and homes submerged.

Official reports show that 42 districts have been declared calamity-stricken. So far, 1,012 people have lost their lives and 1,220 have been injured. Over one million people in Punjab and another 0.6 million in Sindh have been evacuated. Many are staying in camps or with relatives, but thousands are still stranded without shelter and waiting for help. The floods have damaged/destroyed 12,587 houses, affected more than 684 schools, and killed over 8,215 livestock, adding to the loss of livelihoods.

The economic damage is immense. The overall cost of the 2025 floods is estimated at more than Rs. 500 billion (1.7 billion US dollars). Agriculture has suffered the hardest blow, with losses of about Rs. 302 billion (1 billion US dollars), nearly three-fourths of the total. About 1.3 million acres of farmland, much of it in Punjab, are now underwater. This destruction has left farming families without income and threatens food security for millions of people across the country.



Penny Appeal Humanitarian Response

Penny Appeal has consistently focused on delivering life-saving assistance in times of crisis. Earlier in June, it provided urgent support to vulnerable communities in Punjab, and at the onset of the flood emergency in August 2025, it promptly launched a comprehensive response in KP and Punjab.

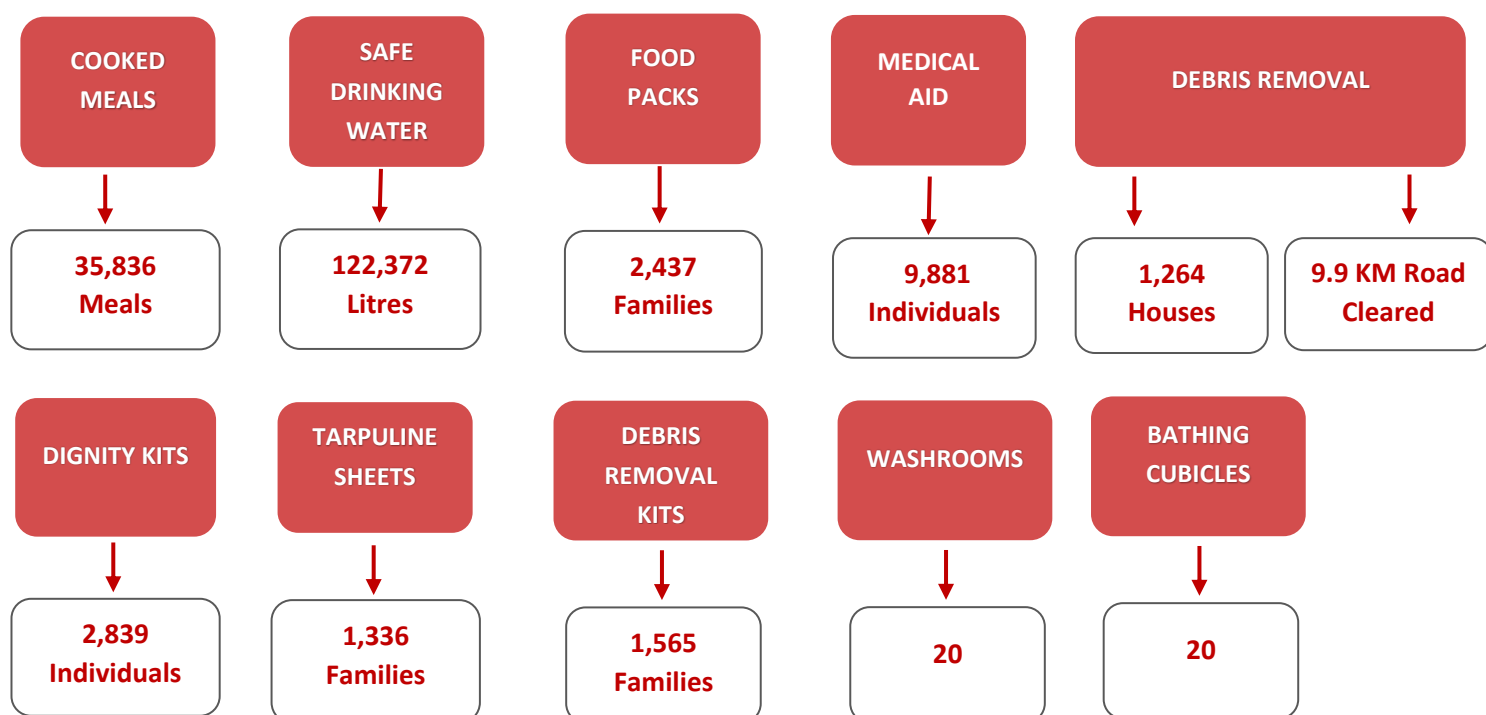
Recognizing the urgent needs of affected families, Penny Appeal's interventions have included active participation in rescue operations, distribution of cooked meals, provision of clean drinking water, hygiene kits, and medical aid. In addition, the organization has supplied debris removal kits and carried out debris clearance activities to help restore safe access for communities.

So far, Penny Appeal has provided 35,872 Fresh Meals, 122,372 Litre of Safe Drinking Water, provided Medical Aid to 9,881 people and have cleared 9.9 KM road and 1,264 households through Debris Removal activity and constructed 20 washrooms as well as 20 bathing cubicles in established camps (Bunir). Furthermore, Penny Appeal distributed 1,565 Debris Removal Kits, 2,839 Hygiene/Dignity Kits, 1,336 Tarpuline Sheets and 2,437 Food Pack among flood effected families. Penny Appeal remains committed to reaching the most vulnerable with urgent life-saving support.
