Current Situation

Pakistan's 2025 monsoon season has been declared a national calamity where the northern regions like Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP) and Gilgit Baltistan (GB) have been severely affected by the floods, cloud bursts and landslides. The torrential floods and landslides have led to significant destruction, with severe damage since the mid of August.

The Disaster Management Authority declared nine districts as calamity hit regions where the powerful torrents of water and debris, swept away whole villages in Buner, Swat, Swabi, and Shangla. The devastation is immense, resulting in a significant number of deaths and a profound effect on infrastructure and livelihoods.

This flood's human toll is a tragedy, with more than 804 people dead and 1,088 injured throughout the country. The most significant impact has been in the mountainous areas, as more than half of deaths occurred in KP province. Communities in regions like Buner and Swat are reeling from the sudden cloudbursts, and many people are still missing, leaving families broken. The crisis has also displaced thousands, with nearly 7,465 homes damaged or destroyed, leaving many families homeless and facing a dire humanitarian situation.

Currently, the situation in Punjab Province is escalating due to the increased river flow from the Indian side. Several districts, including Narowal, Sialkot, Faisalabad, Lahore, and Hafizabad, are experiencing medium-level flooding. In addition, the region has received approximately 300 mm of rainfall, which has further intensified the river flow. The next 12 to 24 hours are very critical, as additional inflows of water from India are expected to enter Pakistan during this period, potentially worsening the flood situation.



Penny Appeal Humanitarian Response

Providing life-saving assistance during emergencies has been the niche of the Penny Appeal while providing immediate assistance in June to communities in Punjab and has initiated the response on the onset of the flood emergency in Swat and Buner in August.

Realizing the immediate needs, Penny Appeal has been providing support in Rescue Operations, delivering Cooked Meals, Food Packages, Clean Drinking Water, Hygiene/Dignity Kits, Medical Assistance and Debris Removal Operations to restore safe access.

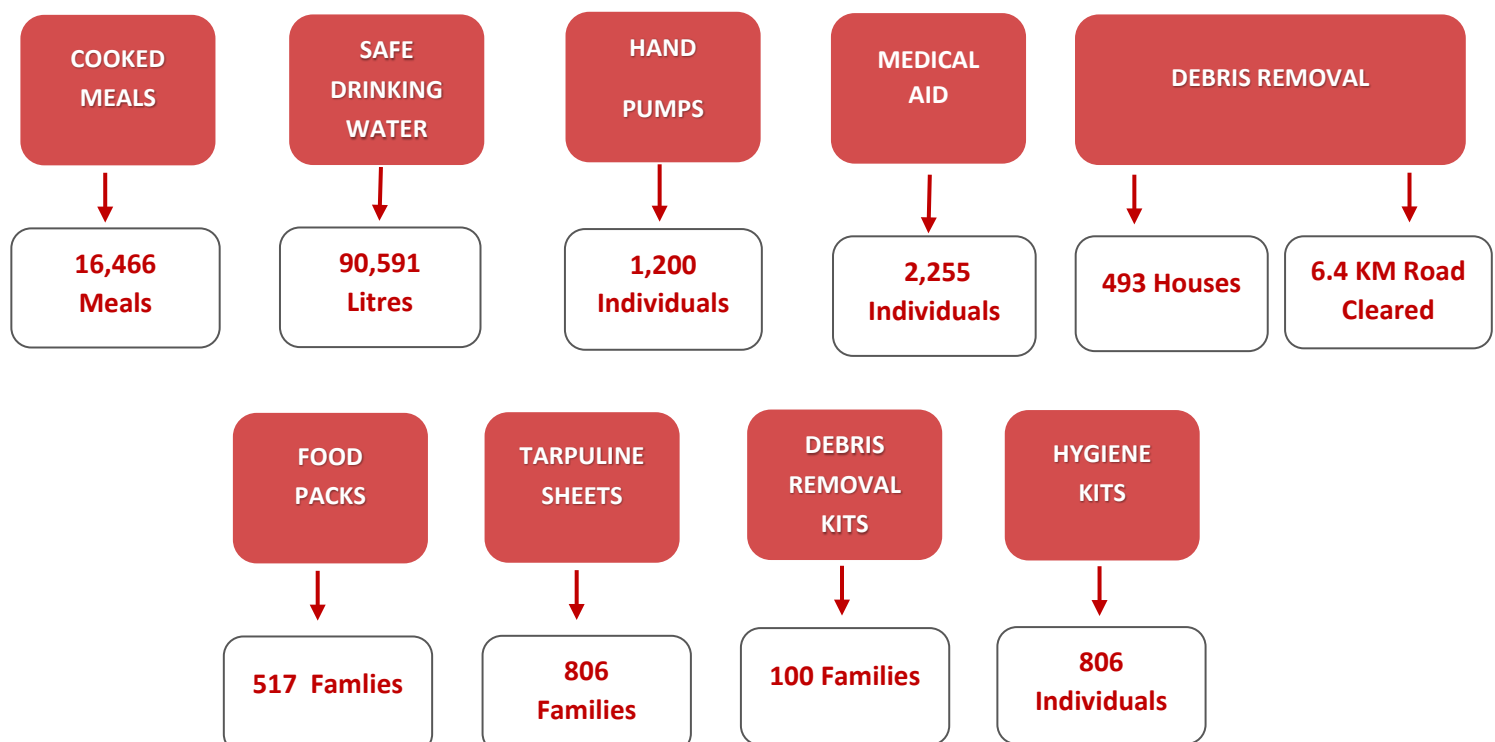
So far, Penny Appeal has provided 16,466 Fresh Meals, 90,591 Litre of Safe Drinking Water, provided Medical Aid to 2,255 people and have cleared 6.4 KM road and 493 households through Debris Removal activity. Furthermore, Penny Appeal distributed 100 Debris Removal Kits, 806 Hygiene Kits, 806 Tarpuline Sheets and 517 Food Packages among flood effected families.

Penny Appeal remains committed to reaching the most vulnerable with urgent life-saving support.
